The NCS Annual Report 2022/2023 gives a comprehensive account of the significant achievements and key activities of National Council of Sports, major performances of National Sports Associations/Federations, the challenges encountered, future strategies and priorities for the next planning/performance year 2023/2024.

The report details how effective NCS has been at achieving its objectives for the year as outlined in the NCS Strategic Plan 2020/2025 and the National Development Plan III.

INTRODUCTION

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The National Council of Sports (NCS) Annual Report for the Year 2022/2023 is submitted in accordance with the requirements of the National Council of Sports Act, Cap. 48. NCS prepares an annual Work Plan, which identifies the priority activities to be undertaken over the financial year. This report therefore summarizes the performance of the Council during the period under review with particular reference to management and administration, finance, and technical departments, achievements, constraints and future strategies.



1.1. Mandate of the Council

National Council of Sports (NCS) is a semi-autonomous Agency of government under the Ministry of Education and Sports established under the 1964 Act of Parliament to among other objects, control, regulate, promote and develop all forms of sports activities in the country in conjunction with National Sports Federations/Associations.

1.2 Functions of the Council

The functions of the Council as stipulated under the National Council of Sports Act are as follows;

- (i) Develop and promote all forms of sport on national basis, in conjunction with voluntary amateur sports bodies, and also providing training and the required staff.
- (ii) Encourage and facilitate cooperation among the various national sports associations.
- (iii) Approve international and national sports competitions and festivals organized by national and other associations.
- (iv) Organize, in conjunction with the nation associations, national and international competitions and festivals as a means of gaining experience and fostering friendly relations with other nations, and other activities as may be approved by the minister.
- (v) Stimulate interest in sports at all levels.
- (vi) Plan the general policy of sports promotion.
- (vii) Award, in consultation with the national associations, medals, diplomas, certificates and other incentives for the encouragement and promotion of sporting activities.
- (viii) Sponsor scholarships for the training of coaches and organizers.
- (ix) Advise the Minister of Sports regarding external relations in the field of sports
- (x) Arrange with local authorities for the provision of sporting facilities at all local levels and to inculcate a high level of sportsmanship and discipline.
- (xi) Approve expenditure of national associations in receipt of grants made or through the Council and to audit the accounts of such associations.



1.3 The Strategic Direction

National Council of Sports has a five-year strategic plan for the period 2020/2021-2024/2025 that provides a framework for all its operations i.e Vision, Mission as well as core values. It outlines the NCS focus over the plan period by elaborating the goal, objectives and planned outcomes as well as interventions.

The Vision

The Vision of National Council of Sports is **“To provide an enabling environment for the promotion and investment in sports in Uganda”**



The Mission

The mission of NCS is to **“Maximising opportunities for all Ugandans to participate and excel in sports”**



1.3.3 NCS core values

MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

2.1. The Council (Board)

National Council of Sports is governed by a Council composed of eleven members including the Chairman, with the General Secretary as an Ex-official. The Council/Board is appointed by the Minister of State for Sports with the responsibility of oversight and policy direction. The Council performs its functions through four statutory committees composed of Finance and Administration, Technical, Audit and Compliance, and Business and Investment.

The Hon. Minister of State for Sports, appointed a new Council on the 15th February 2022, to serve a Two year term. The Composition of the NCS Council is as follows;

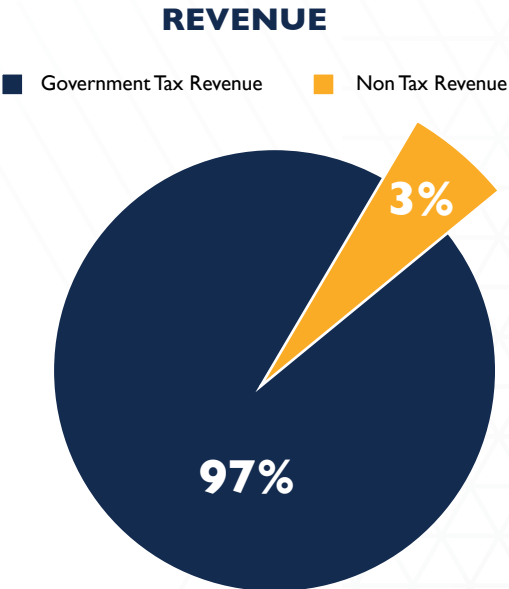

Vote 166 - National Council of Sports was allocated **UGX. 47,812,199,000 (Uganda Shillings Forty-Seven Billion Eight Hundred Twelve Million One Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Only)** of which **UGX. 47,030,812,625 (98%)** is Government of Uganda Tax Revenue and **UGX. 781,386,375 (3%)** is **Non-Tax Revenue** as shown in the Pie Chart below:

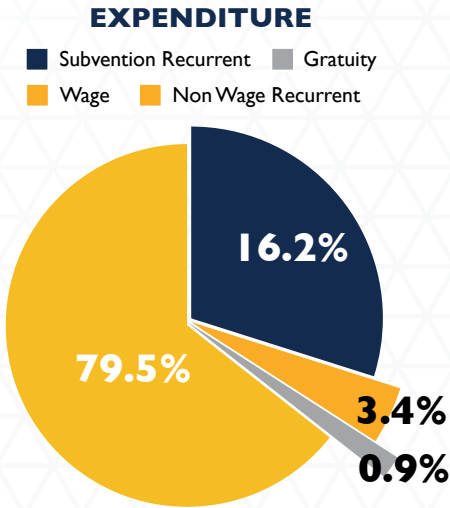

3.2 Releases/Expenditure Cash Limits for FY 2022/2023

Out of the expected expenditure cash limit for the FY 2022/2023 of **UGX. 47,812,199,000 (Uganda Shillings Fourty Seven Billion Eight Hundred Twelve Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Only)**, The Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development (MoFPED) released **UGX. 47,812,199,000 (100%)** for Vote 166.

3.3 Expenditure for the FY 2022/2023

Out of **UGX. 47,812,199,000** transferred from the treasury, **UGX. 1,608,542,000 (3.4%)** was spent on Wage, **UGX. 38,030,985,000 (79.5%)** was incurred on Subvention Recurrent, **UGX. 420,897,000 (0.9%)** was incurred on Gratuity and **UGX. 7,751,775,000 (16.2%)** was incurred on Non-Wage Recurrent.



3.4 Performance of the Council/Board

During the Financial Year 2022/2023, 04 Council/ Board, and 16 Statutory Committee meetings were held respectively to provide oversight and guidance to the Secretariat in the execution of the NCS mandate. In addition, 14 Special/ Adhoc meetings of the Council and Sub Committees were conducted to handle matters of wrangles in conflicted National Sports Associations/Federations and other matters.

3.5 Preparation and submission of the Budget Framework paper

NCS was able to prepare and submit its budget framework for the F/Y 2022/2023 in line with the revised planning framework.

3.6 Review and Formulation of Policies/Guidelines

3.6.1 National Sports Bill, 2023

Following the parliament's discussion and passing of the National Sports Bill, it was submitted to H.E The President of the Republic of Uganda for assent into law. However, H.E the president returned the bill to parliament requiring additional information and clarification on three items. It was returned to the President after amendments and is now waiting for His Excellency the President to assent to it to become a functional law that will repeal the NCS Act of 1964. The New Bill will empower NCS and gives it additional responsibilities that shall call for some restructuring for the entity to deliver on its new mandate.

3.6.2 NCS Statutory Instrument No.38 of 2014

The process to amend the NCS Statutory Instrument.No.38 of 2014 is ongoing. The NCS Select Committee established by Council finalized its report. Once the proposed Amendments are approved by Office of Attorney General, Consultative meetings with stakeholders will be scheduled. However, with the coming into force of the new law, it would be prudent to wait for H.E the President to assent to the law and a new Statutory Instrument issued to that effect.

3.6.3 National Council of Sports Funding Guidelines (Draft)

NCS Draft Funding Guidelines are still awaiting the finalization of the amendment process of NCS Statutory Instrument No. 38 Of 2014, to which they are to be anchored. The Funding Guidelines were presented to the office of the Attorney General for clearance, however to date the same have not been cleared.

3.7 Reward and Recognition of Sportspersons

The President of Uganda, His Excellence Yoweri Kaguta Museveni together with First Lady and Minister of Education and Sports, Hon. Janet Kataaha Museveni hosted Team Uganda to a state function at State House, Entebbe in recognition and celebration of epic sports victories by Uganda athletes at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games where Team Uganda won 3 Gold and 2 Bronze medals, the Oregon World Athletics Championships with Team Uganda claiming 1 Gold and 2 Bronze medals, the Islamic Solidarity Games in Konya with 2 Gold, 4 Silver and 3 Bronze medals, Team Uganda to the World Under20 Athletics Championships in Cali, Colombia that won 1 Bronze medal while the National Men's Rugby 7s Team that won the Bowls Finals at the Rugby 7s World Cup in South Africa and the National Men's Cricket Team that emerged champions of the Africa Cricket T20 Cup, South Africa were recognised.

His Excellence the President rewarded the medallists and teams of the above sports events with cash prizes while Victor Kiplangat, Gold medallist in the Men's Marathon at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games, received a Brand new car. Additionally, the President recognized the legacy of the late Akii Bua, Uganda's first Olympic Gold medalist in 1972 with the family of the late handed a land title of Property.

The National Council of Sports equally rewarded the Birmingham Commonwealth Games Medallists on 30th September 2022 during the 11th National Sports Forum at NCS Lugogo with cash prizes totaling to Ugx. 190 Million; Jacob Kiplimo was awarded Ugx.100Million for the 2 Gold medals in the Men's 5000m and 10000m events, Victor Kiplangat received Ugx.50Million for winning the Men's Marathon event, while Peruth Chemutai and Teddy Nakimuli each won Ugx.20Miillon for the Bronze medals in the Women's 3000m Steeplechase and in the women's flyweight event.



Victor Kiplangat, Gold medallist at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games was rewarded by the President of Uganda with Brand new car.

The Presidential monthly stipend, through State House continues to be extended to top excelling Ugandan athletes with the aim of rewarding/appreciation of athletes who win medals at International Meets and consequently facilitate their training for future events. Since its inception in 2012, selected sports athletes are benefiting from the scheme until they retire from

active competition. The monthly motivational aspect allows for Gold medal winners to receive UGX 5million, Silver medalists UGX 3million while UGX 1million for Bronze medalists. The President has restated his commitment the Presidential stipend scheme with considerations to be made for Technical Officials/coaches of excelling athletes.

3.8 Information and Communication Technology

3.8.1 NCS Online Platforms

The National Council of Sports website is operational and can be accessed via www.ncs.go.ug. The sports web portal provides resourceful information, and daily reporting interaction with the general public for sports development. Equally, social media pages on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram under @NCSUganda1 are available. The platforms provide timely information to the general public on all sports related matters in the country and internationally. The statistics of the different online platforms is as below;

3.8.2 Publications

NCS continued with the compilation, printing and publication of the NCS quarterly magazine which was launched in 2018. The 12th, 13th and 14th volume issues covering the period July to December 2022, January to March 2023 and April to June 2023 respectively were published and distributed countrywide to different stakeholders. Through the magazine editions/volumes, NCS was able to document, showcase and publicize all the major sports activities that took place during the period. The publication remains a major milestone for National Council of Sports.

In addition, NCS was also to compile the annual end of year report for the Financial Year 2022/2023 detailing the performance of the council in the areas of administration, finance, communication, technical/sports matters.

3.8.3 Network Systems

The installation of the Voice Network in NCS Offices has been completed to allow for internal and external communication. The Voice network complements the Data network in ensuring efficient and effective communication and support to work processes at NCS. Equally, Installation of the CCTV Surveillance System was completed with 10 cameras fitted around the Lugogo Sports Complex for surveillance and security purposes given the growing number of events hosted at NCS.

3.9 Human Resource Management

3.9.1. Staff Establishment/composition

By the end of the period 30th June, 2023, the total staffing levels for the National Council of Sports was at fifty nine (59), of these, thirty-Five (35) are established staff and Twenty-Four (24) are support staff. In addition, out of the 59, Sixteen (16) are female and Forty-Three (43) male.

3.9.2. Staff Performance Appraisals and Evaluations

Performance management is a continuous process where staff are assessed on agreed performance targets/standards. The objective is to improve performance. During the period, performance appraisals were conducted for all staff.

3.10. Facility Management

3.10.1. Provision/Utilization of NCS Stadia/Facilities

NCS continues to provide access to stadia/facilities to the different National Sports Federations/Associations in the execution of its core mandate of sports promotion and development.

3.10.2. Maintenance of Facilities

During the period, management ensured that all facilities at the Lugogo Sports Complex were regularly maintained to ensure that they are in proper conditions to facilitate different sports activities for a number of Federations/Associations. All facilities are maintained by Grounds Staff.

3.10.3. Maintenance of the Lugogo Cricket Oval

The turf for the cricket has been routinely mowed and all waste material carried and deposited away from the field. Similarly, the outfield and the dressing rooms were maintained on a regular basis to ensure that they are in perfect conditions

for sports activities. NCS also continued with the application of ant-termites to eliminate all Ant-hills that sprung up at various spots on the grounds. There was continuous mowing of the grounds and outfields.

3.10.4. Maintenance of the National Hockey Pitch

The turf of the hockey pitch continued to be regularly swept to remove any organic material especially fallen leaves from surrounding trees. De-silting of the drainage channels to ensure smooth flow of storm water through the channel was also done.

3.10.5. Maintenance of the Lugogo Tennis Courts

Resurfacing was done on the Lugogo Tennis Courts and general maintenance of the facility.

3.10.6. Maintenance and Operation of Generator

During the quarter the generator was regularly checked and refueled to ensure continuous supply of power even during power outages. Equally, a new automated transfer switch, was installed for the generator.

3.10.7. General Maintenance and repair of offices, indoor stadium and compound

Regular maintenance activities such sweeping, mopping and dusting were done in the various offices and indoor stadium, where as slashing and weeding were done for the compound. The Indoor Stadium also underwent rebranding by Conte-concepts under directives from MTN-Uganda.

3.10.8. Redevelopment of the NCS Complex

National Council of Sports has completed the drafting of a Project Concept Note for the redevelopment of the Lugogo Sports Complex. This will be submitted to the Ministry of Education and Sports then to Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development.

3.11. Other Sports Infrastructural Development Projects

3.11.1 National High Altitude Training Centre – Teryet

The First Phase of the National High Altitude Training Centre – Teryet has been completed and the facility is awaiting to be launched by H.E the President for use by the athletes and teams.

3.11.2. Construction works at Nakivubo Stadium

Construction works at Nakivubo Stadium are ongoing and the stadium is taking shape. The project is being implemented under a Public Private Partnership arrangement with Mr. Hamisi Kiggundu as the private investor. The Ministry of Education and Sports has put in place a project management team comprising of officials from the Ministries of Education, Finance and NCS to monitor and oversee the successful completion of the project. The stadium once complete is expected to sit between 25,000 to 40,000 people laid with an artificial turf for football and will also have facilities for Basketball, Netball, boxing, a Tennis Court, a 400-seater Cinema Hall, Executive boxes, among others. The facility is expected to be ready by December 2023.

3.11.3. Renovation of Mandela National Stadium

The renovation and modernization of Mandela National Stadium is running smoothly and the works on the 01st phase are expected to be completed soon. The UPDF Engineering Brigade successfully evicted all the encroachers who had been enclosed inside the perimeter wall and pulled down all the structures that had been illegally constructed on the sports land. The renovation and modernization of Mandela National Stadium running smoothly and the works on the first phase are expected to be completed by November 2023.

3.11.4. KCCA Phillip Omondi MTN Stadium

The redevelopment of the 10,000 seater Stadium at Lugogo is on course. The concrete structure of the first phase which involves the construction of the club house and the VVIP seating area is near completion. Works on the second phase has commenced and the construction of the pavilion is on-going. The Stadium will also provide facilities for a Club house, offices, dressing rooms, a gym, referees room, anti-doping premises, hospitality areas, and a media tribunal. Government of Uganda offered UGX.10 Billion towards the redevelopment of this facility.

3.11.5. Makerere University Modern Multipurpose Indoor Stadium

Construction works at the Modern indoor stadium at Makerere University is almost completed. The 2000-seater Stadium will be able to host indoor sports such as Handball, Netball, Basketball among others and has been funded by government to the tune of 5.3 Billion shillings.

3.11.6. Ndejje University Sports Complex

Government of Uganda extended to Ndejje University, one Million Dollars (approx. UGX3.8 Billion) as part of its commitment to support the refurbishment and construction of a number of sports facilities at Ndejje University.

4.0 TECHNICAL PERFORMANCE

4.1 National Sports Federations/ Associations Forums

In compliance to the NCS Statutory Instrument No. 38 of 2014, Regulation 17 (4) of the NCS Statutory Instrument, NCS through its Technical Department successfully organized quarterly Statutory National Sports Forums for all the National Sports Federations/ Associations, on the 30th September 2022, 03rd January 2023 and 06th July 2023. As per the provisions of Regulation 17 of the NCS Statutory Instrument, the forums were chaired by the Minister of State for Education and Sports (Sports), Hon. Peter Ogwang.

4.2 National District Sports Outreach Programme

National Council of Sports successfully concluded its National District Sports Outreach /Tours in Central, Western and West Nile Regions of the country. The District Tours had the NCS Team hold engagements with District leaders and sports officers in the Three (3) regions from the 25th June to 01st July 2023.

The objective of the district sports tours is plan, organize and promote sports activities within the district up to national level in conjunction with District Associations. The National Programme is also meant to collectively review the status quo of sports in the districts and jointly help in laying new strategies / chart a new way forward for grassroots sports development as well as to revitalise district sports councils. Earlier, visits were conducted in Northern and Eastern regions. The interactions enable the capture and sharing of challenges encountered in the district localities and jointly come up with workable strategies/interventions on how such prevailing hindrances can be addressed to allow for sports development at district level.

The NCS team highlighted to the stakeholders, the importance of prioritizing sports, gazette land for sports infrastructural development as well as the importance of forming functional District Sports Councils.

4.3 Capacity Building

NCS conducted on capacity building of FORTY (40) female Sports Physiotherapists with hands-on skills in Physiotherapy in a one week Sports Physiotherapy Training at Mestil Hotel, Kampala by Sports Expert, Lutz Meissner from Germany. The skills training was aimed at improving skills of the sports medicine professionals to technically support the management and development of sports athletes.

As part of the measures to fight the use of performance enhancing drugs in sports, the World Anti-doping Agency (WADA) in conjunction with the Regional Anti-doping organization (RADO) and the Uganda Olympic Committee organized a three-day capacity building workshop for training of trainers at the Sheraton Hotel. The NCS Chairperson and Assistant General Secretary/ Technical officiated the training that had participants were drawn from all the countries in Africa Zone 5.

With support from NCS, Capacity Building and trainings were organised in Netball, Lawn Tennis, Skating, Football, Kabaddi and many other National Sports Associations/Federations.

4.3 Support to Community Sports Programs

National Council of Sports continued to support community programs by providing basic sports equipment. During the performance period a total of 19,507 balls, trophies and sets of jerseys were distributed for the period July 2022 to June 2023 as summarized below. The sports equipment were distributed to community sports groups/initiatives across the country in regions Central region, Western Region and West Nile Region during the NCS District Sports Tours.

The Annual Exercise is meant to ascertain the compliance of National Sports Associations/Federations to the Sports Statutory Instruments, No.38 of 2014 and also inform NCS on the status of the recognized National Sports Associations/Federations in Uganda.



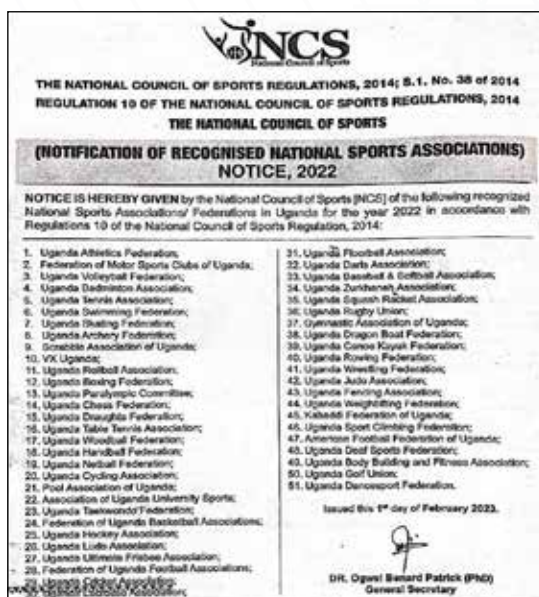

4.6 Registration and Recognition of National Sports Federations/Associations

NCS is mandated under Regulation 9 of the NCS Statutory Instrument No. 38 of 2014 to recognize sports Federations/Associations that meet the criteria to be classified as National Federations/Associations. The total number of NFA's duly registered/ recognized by NCS remained at 51 as at 30th June 2022.

4.7 Annual Gazette

NCS is required by law to gazette all the recognized National Sports Associations annually in the Uganda Gazette. The list of the 51 National Federations/Associations that are recognized and duly registered for the F/Y 2022/23 was published in The Uganda Gazette on 01st February 2023.

4.8 Governance in National Sports Federations

During the year, there was change of leaderships in a number of National Sports Federations bringing on board new leaders in the respective Federations/ Associations. National Council of Sports was represented at each of the assemblies by its staff drawn from the technical department who attended as observers but also offered support and guidance to ensure that the provisions of the respective Federation/ Association constitutions are upheld during the elections.

4.9 Funding support to National Sports Associations

The Government of Uganda is the single largest investor in Uganda's sports system, providing funding for initiatives to support our high-performance athletes and promote sports participation among Ugandans, from the grassroots playground to podium finishing at international sports events. As part of its statutory responsibility to provide Grant in Aid to National Sports Association/Federations in support of various activities, the government of Uganda through the National Council of Sports was able to extend funds to NFs/NA's totaling UGX. 29,917,952,887 as of 30th June 2023. The funds were intended to help Federations/Associations implement their activities which include but are not limited to talent development programs, and support for national team preparations and participation in international, regional, and local competitions.

4.10 Flagging off of National Team to International Competitions

National teams from different national sports federations and associations were flagged off to represent the country in various international sports events that happened during the year.

4.11 Hosting of International Sports Events

In the Fiscal year ended, Uganda successfully hosted the following international sports events:

4.12 Performance of National Associations/Federations

During the period July 2022 to June 2023, Uganda continued to present herself as a sporting nation at national and international level and to this end recorded success in various sports disciplines as follows;

a) XXII Commonwealth Games, Birmingham 2022

At the XXII Commonwealth Games in Birmingham 2022, team Uganda won a total of 05 Medals (03 Gold and 02 Bronze). Jacob Kiplimo in a Games Record of 27:09.19 won the men's 10,000m and also the 5,000m in 13:08.08. Olympic Champion Peruth Chemutai defied odds to claim a bronze medal in the women's 3000m steeplechase and Victor Kiplangat ran 2:10.55 to win the Men's marathon. History was made in Uganda boxing as female boxer Teddy Nakimuli became the first commonwealth female medallist, claiming a bronze medal in the Flyweight event. Uganda hence finished in **16th position overall** and **4th in Africa at the XXII Commonwealth Games in Birmingham.**

Other outstanding performances for Team Uganda were manifested in Netball and Rugby; with the National Netball Team, the She Cranes completing in **5th position** following a well worked out 54-48 victory against South Africa. In Rugby, Uganda's 7s Team finished **10th** in the men's Rugby 7s tournament losing 17-31 to England in the 9th placement game at the Coventry Stadium.

b) 18th World Athletics Championships, Oregon USA

Joshua Cheptegei successfully defended his 10,000m title when he won Gold at the World Athletics Championships in Eugene Oregon USA. Jacob Kiplimo and Oscar Chelimo won Bronze each in 10,000m and 5,000m respectively.

c) 5th Islamic Solidarity Games, Konya 2022

Team Uganda excelled at the 5th Islamic Solidarity Games, where it collected a total of 09 medals, to finish **4th in Africa** and **17th overall**. 15-year-old Para Swimmer, Husnah Kukundakwe was the star of the games with a 6 medal sweep (2 Gold, 3 Silver and 1 Bronze) while in Athletics, Abel Chebet clocked 28:31.39 to win a silver medal in the men's 10,000m and Janat Chemusto claimed a bronze medal in the 5,000m event. Rising star Kirabo Namutebi with a New National Record of 26.42 won a silver medal in the women's 50m freestyle.

Athletics

Team Uganda completed a great seasons outing at the 2022 World Athletics Under20 Championships, in Colombia, with Prisca Chesang winning a bronze medal in the women's 5000m event in the city of Cali.

Jacob Kiplimo clocked 29:17 to win Gold, while Joshua Cheptegei (29: 37) won Bronze in the Senior Men's Event of the 44th World Athletics Cross Country Championships in Bucharest Australia on the 18th February 2023. The wins elevated Uganda to third finish overall.

Thereafter, Jacob Kiplimo (1:01:31) won the 2023 New York Half Marathon while Joshua Cheptegei (1:02:09) finished in second position.

Joshua Cheptegei won a Silver medal in 5000m race in a time of 12:41 at the 2023 Lausanne Diamond League, in Switzerland.

Jacob Kiplimo won a Silver medal in 5000m race clocking 12:41.73 at the 2023 Oslo Diamond League while Sarah Chelangat finished sixth in the women's 3000m steeplechase at the Oslo Diamond League and posted a new National Record on 15th June 2023.

Sarah Chelangat went on to win the Cherry Blossom 10 miles Run in 52:04.

Ugandan Sprinter Tarsis Orogot clocked 20:20 in Men's 200m event at the 2023 Don Kirby Invitational Albuquerque, Boston to set World Lead (WL) and a National Record in the indoor event. Thereafter, Tarsis Orogot finished second (20:12) to claim a Silver medal in men's 200m event at the 2023 NCCA Jacksonville to qualify for the 2023 Budapest World Athletics Championships.

Halima Nakaayi set a Meet Record (MR) of 1:59.18 to win the Meeting Metz Moselle Athletor in the women's 800m event in France.

Victor Kiplagat finished second in 2:06:03 at the 2023 Osaka Marathon in Japan and Geoffrey Kusuro won a gold medal in the men's category clocking 2:10:29 at the 2023 Madrid Marathon in Zurich Switzerland.

Prisca Chesang won a Silver medal in 3000m race in the 2023 Melbourne Continental Tour in Australia. Joy Cheptoyek won a Gold medal in the 10k race in a time of 30:46 at the 2023 Marathon De Castellon in Italy.

Dan Kibet won a Bronze medal in 3000m men's event while Kenneth Kiprop finished 6th at the Marie Plant Meet-Melbourne Continental Tour in Australia in February 2023.

Para athlete, David Emong finished second in the T46 800m at the 7th International Para Athletics Meet in Marrakech, Morocco.

Andrew Kwemoi Rotich clocked 2:07:13 to win the 2023 ENEL Milano Marathon in Italy while Maxwell Rotich emerged winner of the 2023 Nairobi City Mens Half Marathon event in 1:01:10 in Nairobi, Kenya.

Peruth Chemutai clocked 9:11:1 in the 3000m Steeplechase to finish 3rd at the 2023 Lausanne Diamond League.

Doreen Chesang won gold medal in 2:26:31 at the 2023 Madrid Marathon in Zurich Switzerland while Stella Chesang set a new National Record of 2:20:2 and finished third in the 2023 Hamburg Marathon in Germany.

Kibet Dan ran a time of 13:22.04 to win the U20 Men's 5000m event at the 2023 Africa Athletics U18/20 Championships in Ndola, Zambia. In the same event, Rotich Gideon (9:01.21) won a Bronze medal in U20 men's 3000m steeplechase final race.

Archery

Makerere University hosted the National Archery Championships in December 2022 with Police's Archer Moreen winning the recurve Open 70m category, Akram Lukwago won the 50m Recurve with 389 points while Rahma Kassaija won the 30m recurve with 293 points and Saceed Kassaija won the 20m category with 83 points.

American Football

American Football Federation of Uganda conducted a schools tour in central region with the aim of growing and developing the game at the grassroots from 8th March 2023 to 9th April 2023.

Badminton

Team Uganda bagged 1 Gold and 3 Bronze medals at the All Africa Senior Badminton Championships in South Africa in February 2023 with Uganda's Fadilah Shamika Rafi Mohammed Championing the Women Singles category.

Team Uganda won a total of 17 medals; 4 Silver and 13 Bronze medals at the 2022 Uganda International Para Badminton Championships hosted at the Lugogo Indoor Stadium, Kampala and thereafter claimed 5 Gold, 8 Silver, 18 Bronze medals at the 2022 African Para-Badminton Championships at Lugogo Indoor Stadium.

Baseball and Softball

Uganda Baseball U12 Men's Team won the Africa World Cup Qualifiers in January 2023 to qualify for the Baseball U12 World Cup set for July/August 2023 in Taipei, China.

Uganda qualified as Africa's representative for the XXI WBSC U18 Baseball World Cup for the first time in Gil Gil Kenya.

Basketball

Uganda emerged winners of the FIBA Africa U16 Zone 5 Qualifiers 2023 in Kigali Rwanda in June 2023. Uganda beat hosts Rwanda (59-56) and defeated Tanzania (116-49) in the 3 nations tournament.

Uganda's women national Basketball Team, the Gazelles finished second after losing 65-74 to Egyptian at the FIBA Women Afro Basket Zonal Qualifiers in February 2023.

Uganda's U18 Female Basketball team emerged champions of the 2022 FIBA Zone 5 U18 Afro Basket Tournament at the Lugogo Indoor Stadium.

Uganda hosted the FIBA Afro Basket Qualifiers at the Lugogo Indoor Stadium from the 14th to 19th February 2023. Five countries Egypt, Kenya, Rwanda, South Sudan and Uganda participated.

Buddo Secondary School 3x3 Girls Basketball Team emerged champions of the African Schools 3x3 Basketball Championships in Morocco.

UCU Lady Canons retained the 2022 FUBA Women Basketball League Title after defeating JKL Lady Dolphins while City Oilers claimed their 08th National Basketball League Title after defeating the Namugongo Blazers at Lugogo.

Boxing

Sparks Boxing Club clinched their maiden National Novice Boxing Championships 2022 with 45 clubs and over 500 boxers taking part in the tournament at Lugogo in junior, youth and elite categories.

Lukanga Boxing Club retained the National Intermediates Boxing Championships for a third consecutive time. The club beat 34 other clubs to the title at Lugogo.

Body Building

Yakub Bin Hassan won a Gold medal (75kg Category) in the participated in the 2022 Men's physique Body building Championship in South Africa.

Cricket

The Uganda Cricket Cranes emerged champions of the inaugural Africa T20 Cricket Cup Challenge (Men) Cup 2022 in Benoni, South Africa.

The Cricket Cranes (Men's Team) and the Victoria Pearls (Female Cricket Team) emerged Champions of East Africa in the 2022 East Africa Cricket T20 Series in Kigali, Rwanda.

Uganda's Sipi Trekkers and Itanda Kayakers emerged winners of the 2023 Waterfalls Elite League in the women's and men's events respectively at Lugogo Cricket Oval with countries Botswana, Kenya, Rwanda and Uganda featuring in the event.

The Cricket Cranes won the inaugural Continental Cup T20 Tournament in Nairobi defeating hosts Kenya by 1 run in a low scoring thrilling final. The tournament featured four teams that included hosts Kenya, Uganda, Botswana and Rwanda. The teams played a triple round robin format with nine games played with the Cricket Cranes only losing a single game to the hosts Kenya.

The Cricket Cranes (Men's team) bowed out of the ICC World Cup Qualifiers and missed an ODI status after finishing 2nd in the 3 leg Challenge League B.

Thereafter, the National Women's Cricket Team won the Capricorn Eagles Quadrangular Series that featured UAE, Namibia, Hong Kong and Uganda.

The Cricket Cranes won two and lost two games of their games at the Qatar Invitational Tour in March 2023 in Qatar.

Cycling

Uganda's seed one cyclist, Charles Kagimu won a Gold medal in the Elite Category of the 2022 Africa Individual Time Trials Road Race Championships in Ghana while Lorot Lawrence claimed a Silver in the Individual Time Trials

(Junior category) and Team Uganda won a Team Bronze.

Thereafter in April 2023, Kagimu won the ITEN, Kenya for the Great Rift Valley Challenge while Lumulia Paul finished third and Aziz Sempijja was in position six. Charles Kagimu emerged 18th out of 1500 riders overall in the 250KM race of the Texas USA Time Trials in May 2023 in preparations of the 2023 UCI Road World Championships in Scotland.

Chess

FM Wanyama (8pts) emerged overall winner of the 2022 Rwabushenyi Open in Kiwatule. South Sudan's Pathoum Madoi Garang finished second (7pts) in a tournament that featured participants from Afghanistan, South Sudan, Kenya, Tanzania and Somalia. Kiira College, Butiki won the 2022 Father Grams National Schools Chess Open Championships.

Canoe and Kayak

On May 12th 2023, The federation gave out 8 kayaks to clubs, this was witnessed by the Honorable Minister of State for Sports, Peter Ogwang and NCS AGST Mr. Katende David. The kayaks were manufactured by the federation locally but matching the international standards.

The federation also opened up the western region High Performance Centre at Lake Kimbugu in Rukungiri District with the aim of achieving national coverage and to serve Paddlers in Western Uganda. An assortment of boats (kayaks, canoes, and rescue crafts-paddle boats) plus requisite accessories like paddles and life jackets were delivered to the site to enable the High Performance Centre start.

Darts

Uganda emerged champions of the 2022 East Africa Darts Championships in Dar es salaam.

Odoi Job and Sarah Makanaga emerged winners of the 2022 Uganda International Darts Open men's and women's categories respectively in Bweyogerere.

Uganda's Sarah Makanga emerged the women's champion of the Egyptian Open Darts Championships and Africa Darts Championships in Luxor, Egypt in March 2023. In the same event, Job Henry Odoi won the men's category of the African Darts Championships.

Uganda Darts Association held the Umpiring Training Course in May 2023 at Mamerito Hotel Bweyogerere ahead of the National League and in preparation of the World Darts Championships in Netherlands.

Dance Sport

Uganda emerged 21st overall and 1st in Africa out of 106 countries that participated in the Break breaking dance Qualifiers to 2024 Paris Olympics in Montpellier, France with Ndawula Ronald qualifying for the World DanceSport Games in Birmingham, UK.

Team Uganda to the 2023 WDSF African Breaking Championships in Rabat, Morocco was knocked out in the round of 16 while Ndawula Ronald with 3 points progressed to the 2024 Paris Olympic qualifications.

Dragon Boat

In commemoration of 60 years of establishment of the Bilateral Relations between Uganda and China, Uganda organized the Uganda-China Boat Festival at Buloba Park in November 2022. The event had Uganda emerge winners of the sports event and was graced by H.E The Ambassador of China (Zhang Lizhong), and NCS General Secretary, among others.

Football

The National U20 Men's Football, The Hippos successfully defended their CECAFA U20 Title and consequently qualified for the 2023 U20 Africa Cup of Nations due in Egypt.

Uganda's Crested Cranes won the 2022 CECAFA Women's Cup, hosted at the FUFA Technical Centre – Njeru and consequently qualified for the 2022 Women Africa Cup of Nations in Morocco.

The Crested Cranes drew one game and lost two in the Group A at the 2022 Women Africa Cup of Nations in Morocco to finish bottom of the group and consequently bowed out the tournament.

In the 2023 Africa Nations Championships (CHAN) Qualifiers, Uganda Cranes won 1-0 in the first leg in Dar es salaam of the first round at Benjamin Mkapa Stadium in August 2022 and 3-0 in the return leg played in September 2022 at St. Mary's Stadium Kitende to qualify for the sixth time in a row and progressed on a 4-0 goal aggregate for the CHAN 2023 in Algeria.

The Uganda Cranes won Senegal 1-0, drew with DR Congo, and lost 1-3 to Ivory Coast 0-0 in Group B games of the 2023 African Nations Championships CHAN to finish third in the group. The Cranes failed to qualify for the quarter finals.

The Uganda Cranes lost 1-2 to Algeria in their AFCON 2024 Qualifiers Campaim in Douala, Cameroon where they hosted Algeria and later won 1- 0 against Tanzania in Dare salaam. The result left Uganda in third place with **4** points. Algeria who have already qualified stand at **15** points, Tanzania **7** points and Niger **2** points. Uganda's chances of making it to the 2023 Africa Cup of Nations in Ivory Coast are minimal and the fate is beyond their own reach after suffering defeat to Algeria on Sunday.

Vipers Sports Club emerged champions of the 2022/2023 Uganda Premier League.

Golf

Andrew Ssekibejja won the 2022 Tusker Malt Uganda Amateurs Golf Open with an exceptional score of 295 strokes (gross) on the par 72 golf course over a four-day period at the Serena Golf Course. Micheal Tumusiime, finished in the second place while the defending champion, Joseph Cwinya-ai managed to come in third place.

David Plenderleith (80 gross) and Monica Ntege Azuba (85 gross) won the overall gross championship men and women titles, respectively of the 2022 Uganda Seniors open golf championship at the par 72 Uganda Golf Club.

Gymnastics

Team Uganda completed in 11th position at the 17th Rhythmic Gymnastics African Championships 2023 in Mauritius.

Handball

Uganda finished in 4th position at the 2023 Africa Women Beach Handball Games in Hamamet, Tunisia.

Uganda finished 2nd and 4th respectively in the U18 and U20 Zone V IHF Trophy Tournament in October 2022.

Uganda Handball Federation held its 3rd Handball Awards Gala in February 2023 in Bugolobi and recognized outstanding players in the 2022 season.

Judo

Uganda finished 7th at the 2023 Grand Slam Paris 2023 in Paris from 4th to 5th February 2023 with 2 athletes representing the country; Ivan Bakitya in 73Kgs and Zubeda Talikaza in 70kg.

Kabadi

Uganda hosted the maiden East Africa Secondary Schools Kabadi Championships at Lugogo in December 2022 and emerged overall winners in both Men's (Mulusa Academy) and Women categories (Matuga High School). Tanzania, Zanzibar, Burundi and Uganda participated in the Championships.

Star Palates Club and Angles Club emerged winners of the 2022 National Kabadi League in the men's and women's categories respectively in November 2022 in Bugolobi.

Kabaddi Federation of Uganda also conducted a kabaddi refreshers/capacity building activity in May 2023 at ACP Hotel Kigogwa.

Lacrosse

The Uganda Men's Lacrosse team competed in the 2023 World Lacrosse Championships in San Diego, USA for the third time in its history, playing seven games and trailed during the competition. Prior to this, the Under21 Men's team participated in the 2022 World U21 men's Championships in Ireland with the team losing all its games.

Ludo

Uganda Ludo National Team, the Doves emerged overall champions of the 2022 Ludo World Cup held in Nepal.

Motorsport

Uganda emerged Champions of the 2022 CAC Motor Cross Championships in Nairobi, Kenya while Jas Mangat won the 2022 Pearl of Africa Motor Rally Championships in Kampala, Uganda.

The 2023 Kabalega Rally was held in Hoima, as part of the National Rally Championships 2023. The rally was won by Yasin Nasser, who extended his NRC lead and Ponsiano Lwakataka finished 2:16.85 in second position.

Netball

National Insurance Corporation Netball Club won women's title of the 2023 East Africa Clubs Netball Championships while WOB Netball Club won the Men event in Nairobi Kenya.

The National Women's Netball Team, the She Cranes, participated in Fast 5 World Series Championships in Christchurch, New Zealand in November 2022. Uganda finished 05th in the series won by Australia.

Paralympics

Para Powerlifter Dennis Mbazira won a Bronze in the 2022 Africa Open Championships in Cairo, Egypt.

Husnah Kukundakwe participated in nine qualifying events in preparation for 2023 World Championships in Manchester, where she qualified in 3 events including; 100m Breaststroke at the time of 1:30.50 MQS, 100m Butterfly at the time of 1:36.80MET, 200IM at the time of 3:12.91 MET.

Prior to this, Husnah Kukundakwe scooped 2 bronze medals at the Para Swimming World Series in Italy.

Oroma Peace T13 in 1:00:95 won a Silver medal in the women's 400m to qualify for Accra African Games and World Para Athletic Championships in Paris France.

Oroma Peace T13, won a bronze medal in 1500m clocking 4:49:40 qualifying for All Africa Games and World Para Athletic championship in Paris France.

David Emong T46 won a silver medal in 800m clocking 4:13:02 which qualifies him to World Para Athletics Championship in Paris and All Africa Games in Ghana. He also emerged in the 5th position in the 1500m race in Marrakesh Morocco.

Tumusiime Gad Rauben T11 was 5th position in 1500m wheeled race with a time of 4:57:71 missing World Para Athletics by 25 seconds and in 5000m race, ran at the time of 18:48:49 missing qualification by 1 minute 30 seconds.

Ociira Richard T54 wheel chair race, 1500m wheeled with a time of 4:57:33 missing World Para Athletics by 1 minute.

Masisa Fred T11 and Lagu Alex T46 participated in 200m and 400m races but need more training to improve their performance.

Pool

The Uganda National Women's Pool Team, the Pool Cranes clinched the 2022 Africa Blackball Championships Trophy in Zambia.

Mbale Pool Club were crowned champions of the 2022 PAU National Men's Pool League in Kampala.

Rugby

The Rugby Cranes emerged Champions of the 2022 Africa Rugby Sevens hosted at Kyadondo Rugby Club with 14 countries taking part in the Continental event.

The Rugby Cranes won the Bowl at the 2022 Rugby 7s World Cup held in South Africa.

Stanbic Black Pirates emerged champions of the Nile Special Rugby Premier League 2023 after a 24-07 win over Kobs in the finals in Kampala.

Thunderbirds won 26-05 against Avengers and She Wolves won 7-0 against Kitgum Queens in the 2023 Rotary Girl Child 7s Tournament at Kyadondo, a tournament aimed at making awareness on gender based violence.

Uganda hosted the 2022 Rugby Africa Women's Pool B Tournament in November 2022, at Wankuluku Stadium. Uganda with 5 points finished in Second position while Kenya won the group event.

Rowing

Uganda sent a contingent of 15 athletes to the Kenya Rowing Championships in Mombasa as a pathway to the 2024 Olympic Games and training camp for rowers. Uganda's Darius Okello and Sarah Enokokin Olar both finished in second positions against the Kenyan counterparts.

Roll Ball

Uganda participated in the 6th Rollball World Cup 2023 that took place in Pune India with 36 team taking part in men's and women's events. The competition attracted 36 teams in total, 10 for women, and 26 for men. Uganda lost all the games.

Scrabble

Uganda finished in fourth (4th) out of 10 Countries at the 2022 Africa Scrabble Championships in Lusaka-Zambia.

Skating

Uganda hosted the Uganda Junior and Senior Speed Skating Championships at Mandela National Stadium with participants from Kenya, Tanzania and Democratic Republic of Congo. The championship was dominated by Kenya while Uganda finished second and DR Congo finished third.

Prior to this, the Uganda skaters participated in the Street and Park World Skateboarding Championships in February 2023 in Sharjah U.A.E one of the Olympics qualifier where our skaters gained good points for Olympics qualification pathway with Bukenya Brian securing 40.268 points while Mwesigwa Douglas secured 20.47 points.

In an attempt to qualify for the Paris Olympics 2024, Uganda sent a street skating team to Italy where our skaters gained remarkable points and their ranking improved. Bukenya Brian is now ranked 156th in the world and 4th in Africa, Muwonge Calvin is ranked 161st in world and 5th in Africa while Douglas 206th in the World and 27th in Africa.

Squash

Paul Kadoma defeated Jonathan Mwegamire (3-2) in an epic final of the 2023 Uganda Squash 3 at Kampala Club. Thereafter, Paul Kadoma also won the Kinyara Sugar Limited Open Squash Tournament at Kampala Club after beating Kenya's Jimmy Daldi in the men's singles final.

Swimming

Kirabo Namutebi clocked 26.01 to win Uganda's first senior medal at the Africa Senior Swimming Championships in the 50m freestyle event in Tunisia.

Uganda's Tara Kisawuzi won 8 Gold medals in the 13-14 years category and led Team Uganda to a third place (2,521.5pts) finish at the 2022 CANA Zone 3 Swimming Championships in Tanzania. Uganda's other Gold medals came from Zara Mbagu, John Kafumbe and Charlotte Sanford.

Thereafter, Tara Kisawuzi and Kirabo Namutebi collected 3 and 4 Gold medals each at the South Africa Regional Age Group Swimming Championships in South Africa in April 2023.

Kirabo Namutebi won (3 Gold, 1 Silver) and Tendo Mukalazi (1 Gold, 1 Silver) at the 2022 CANA Zone IV Championships in Lusaka, Zambia.

Ndejje University's Rashida Najjuma starred at the 2022 East Africa University Games, winning 12 Gold medals in the swimming event at Ndejje University.

Grators Swim Club emerged the 2023 USF National Swimming Championships in Kampala.

Table Tennis

The National Table Tennis team won a Silver (Ladies) and Bronze (Men) medal in the 2023 Regional Senior Championship & Olympics Qualifier in Djibouti.

Uganda Table Tennis Clubs participated in Africa Table Tennis Club Championships in Nairobi, Kenya from 6th – 8th May 2023. Kibuli Table Tennis Club won a Silver medal on 3-0 score against Egypt Table Tennis Club, while Nakasero Primary School won a bronze medal on a 3-1 against Kenya's City Eagle Table Tennis club.

Tennis

Uganda's U12 Boys' team won Gold while Girls' team came in 3rd position behind Kenya and Burundi at the East Africa Junior U-12 Tennis Championships in Kigali, Rwanda.

Uganda hosted ITF J30 (two legs) Tournament at Lugogo Tennis Complex from the 21st May to 4th June 2023. The tournament attracted players from India, Egypt, Luxemburg, UK, USA, Italy, Ghana, Kenya, Rwanda, Burundi and Tanzania.

Uganda's Junior team of 14 & under and 16 & under participated in the U-14 and U-16 East Africa Junior U-12 Tennis Zonal Championship held in Bujumbura in January 2023.

Uganda sent a team in the Davis Cup by Rakuten-Africa Group V hosted by DRC Congo at Cercle De Kinshasa in June 2023. The championship included Uganda, Gabon, Congo, DRC, Tanzania, Burundi, Mauritius, Ethiopia Madagascar, Djibouti, Lesotho and Seychelles. Uganda was represented by John Oduke as Captain, Frank Tayebwa, Troy Adrian Zziwa, Paul Sekandi and Trevor Solomon Kazibwe.

University Sports

Ndejje University won the 12th Edition of East Africa University Games, for the seventh time in a row. The games organized by the Federation of East Africa University Sports were hosted at Ndejje University.

Uganda was represented by Ndejje and Makerere University, at the 3*3 FASU Basketball

Championships 2023 at Johannesburg University, South Africa. Makerere University won Bronze after beating North West University of South Africa.

Volleyball

KCCA Volleyball Club and Sport-S were crowned champions of the National Volleyball League in the women's and Men's categories respectively in Kampala.

VX Uganda

VX Uganda conducted a capacity building training course for 7 coaches at old Kampala hospital board room on 26th June 2023.

Weightlifting

David Niyoyita won 3 Gold Medals (Snatch 90Kg, Jerk 120Kg, Total 210Kg) at the 2022 Africa Junior Weightlifting Championships in Casablanca, Morocco.

Uganda Weightlifting Federation organized a national competition with the aim of talent identification and development in Busia district for under 15years, targeting age groups 12years to 14 years, in preparation for youth Olympic Games Dakar 2023.

Woodball

The Uganda Woodball Federation organized the National Wood Ball Coaching Course level I at Mengo Senior School, Kampala in May 2023 with several participants acquiring skills of the sport.

CHALLENGES

5.1 Inadequate Legal Framework

5.1.1. Review of the NCS Act 1964

The process to review the NCS Act is ongoing since the principles for the review were approved by Cabinet in 2013. Although the process was started, this has been complicated by the absence of a national sports policy which is supposed to provide the basis for the Act. The obsolete Act is oblivious to the modern development trends in sports.

5.1.2. Lack of a National Sports Policy

The absence of a national sports policy has impacted the performance of the sports subsector. The sports policy is meant to provide overall strategic direction for the sector. The process to formulate a sports policy are still at preliminary level. Without a national policy in place, review of the NCS 1964 Act cannot proceed.

5.2 Inadequate funding to the Sports Sector

The budget cuts experienced at the beginning of F/Y 2022/2023 have affected the performance of NCS. The gap created has meant that NCS was no longer in position to extend direct budget support to several Federations/Associations that previously were receiving such support from NCS. In addition, the cuts also meant that all the federations had to share the modest allocation that had remained for National Sports Federations/Associations. Therefore, the demand for more funding remains huge. More resources are therefore required to facilitate national teams/athletes to participate in major international championships given that many National associations have limited sources of income.

5.3 Taxes on Sports Equipment

International Sports Federations and Donors often donate to National Associations/Federations sports equipment to aid development of the respective sports and for use at both community and national level. However, the high tax on the sports equipment is a major hindrance to sports development given the limited budgets of National Associations/Federations. During the period NCS, had to clear taxes on equipment donated to Uganda Table Tennis Association, and Uganda Kabaddi Federation which money would have been put to other use for the promotion

and development of the respective sports. There is need for a tax waiver on Sports Equipment given the fact that this equipment is not for profit making nature.

5.4 Inadequate Technical Capacity

Many Federations/Associations still grapple with the challenge of lack of personnel with adequate Technical Capacity and skills are internationally accredited which has continued to affect the promotion and development across the different sports disciplines. Capacity building for the technical personnel that are required like Coaches, Umpires, Referees, Managers and sports medical personnel is of paramount importance if Uganda is to produce excelling athletes across the sports disciplines, and improve on the performance so far registered in a few sports disciplines.

5.5 Governance of Sports Associations

Governance challenges continue to affect the smooth operation of many Federations/Associations that has led to conflict and creation of factions. The continued leadership wrangles have affected the growth of the respective sports. NCS has instituted mechanisms to try and mediate between the warring parties but progress has been slow.

5.6 Limited Sports Facilities

NCS is mandated under the NCS Act of 1964 under section 2 [i] [a] to provide stadia and other facilities for sports activities. However, the number and quality of facilities available is still inadequate. The country has only one standard indoor facility which is in dire need of refurbishment to put it to the desired international standards. In addition, the Tennis courts and Hockey Pitch require major refurbishment and yet NCS does not have the resources to undertake the much needed renovations.

5.7 Accountability and Transparency in National Associations

This has continued to be a major hindrance to the effective performance of NFA's. The NFA's that have received support from NCS continue to submit accountabilities and performance reports which affects the performance of NCS. In certain instances, the accountabilities submitted are incomplete or doubtful on verification.

9.8 Delay in submission of required and submission of inaccurate data from National Sports Federations/Associations

Accurate is a foundation for policy making and budgeting. However, Many NF/A's do not have data on their programs, athletes, technical personnel among sets of data required. The absence of such data affects in the planning, funding and evaluation of activities relating to the sports sub-sector. In addition, when the information is requested for, it is submitted late and in some cases very inconsistent.

9.9 Inadequate staffing in Federations/Associations

Limited attention has been given to the recruitment, training, mentoring of staff in many national sports federations/associations and this has resulted into management and administrative challenges that have impacted the performance of these bodies.

STRATEGY AND PRIORITIES

FINANCIAL YEAR 2023/2024

5.1 Strategies

National Council of Sports plans to undertake the following:

- To engage stakeholders for the review of the National Sports Policy, and NCS Act.
- Engage stakeholders on the need for more funding for the sports subsector
- NCS will continue to engage the National Federations/ Associations through meetings in order to build their capacity.
- Undertake human resource training and development to enhance the capacity of NCS staff for better service delivery
- To undertake stakeholder mobilization and engagement for the betterment of sports
- Pursue more opportunities for partnerships and collaboration, in addition to strengthening existing partnerships.
- Pursue public private partnerships within and outside to attract more resources to the sector in order to address areas that have been underserved like infrastructure development.
- Collaborate with district local governments to enrich the community sports program strategy.
- Collaborate with National Sports Federations/Associations to compile data on various sports programs and activities to inform decision making.

5.2 Priorities

- (i) **2024 Paris Olympics and 13th African Games:** Preparation of teams to qualify for the 2024 Paris Olympics and the 13th African Games, Accra will begin in earnest, and NCS shall put emphasis on ensuring that Uganda qualifies more athletes with a focus to bettering Uganda's performance at the last outing of the games.
- (ii) **Policies/guidelines:** NCS will fast track the review of the National Council of Statutory Instrument No.38 of 2014 to provide the anchoring for all the funding guidelines whose formulation has stalled.
- (iii) **Grassroots Sports Development Programs:** NCS will continue to provide the necessary sports equipment and training of coaches, referees and umpires in order to spur community participation in sports.
- (iv) **Grant in aid:** Provide Grant in aid to National Associations in line with the mandate and priorities of NCS.
- (v) **Capacity building Programs:** NCS plans to hold more capacity building programs for National Sports Associations in order to build/create awareness among its staff and members on the need for timely and quality financial reporting in the management of public resources.
- (vi) **National Forum of Sports Associations:** As provided for under Regulation 17 of the NSI No.14 NCS will continue to hold the mandatory quarterly forum under the stewardship of the Minister of State for Sports to devise strategies to spur sports promotion and development in Uganda.
